Sight Words

Dolch words, or sight words, provide an excellent base for reading at an early age. Many of the words can't be "sounded out" and need to be learned by sight. The Pre-Primer (Pre-K) and Primer (Kindergarten) are listed below. You can practice your sight words in many ways. Here are some ways that may help you learn them:

- write them the way you were for homework in your Kindergarten Sight Word notebook
- study them using your Sight Word rings or flashcards
- write them in shaving cream, sand, paint, or some other cool medium
- spell them out with objects (magnetic letters, scrabble letters, alphabet cereal, etc.)
